Dear Mr. Lloyd:

Because of the priority this office has to give requests from State Agencies and public officials, I have been unable to answer your request until this time. I hope that it is in time to be of some use to you. In regard to your question concerning State supported institutions accepting graduates from a South Carolina high school, there is no statutory requirement that State institutions of higher learning must accept any graduate from a South Carolina high school. As for the teaching of the black experience in the public schools, there is no such statutory requirement that such a subject be offered in the public schools.

In answer to your next question, South Carolina does have statutory requirements for school bus transportation. Enclosed is South Carolina Code of Laws, Sections 21-791-21-839.9 and the later amendments to this Act. In answer to your last question, South Carolina also has statutory provisions for free textbooks, which are also enclosed.

Again, I hope that this information reaches you in time to be of some assistance. Sincerely,
